Background

Rajasthan is the largest state of the Republic of India in terms of area. It encompasses most of the area of the large, inhospitable Great Indian Desert (Thar Desert), which has an edge paralleling the Sutlej-Indus river valley along its border with Pakistan. The region borders Pakistan to the west, Gujarat to the southwest, Madhya Pradesh to the southeast, Uttar Pradesh and Haryana to the northeast and Punjab to the north. Rajasthan covers an area of 132,150 sq mi or 342,269 km². The state capital is Jaipur. Rajasthan was formed on 30 March 1949, when all erstwhile princely states ruled by Rajputs, known as Rajputana, merged into the Dominion of India. The only difference between erstwhile Rajputana and Rajasthan is that certain portions of what had been British India, in the former province of Ajmer-Merwara, were included. Portions lying geographically outside of Rajputana such as the Sumel-Tappa area were given to Madhya Pradesh.

Rajasthan's economy is primarily agricultural and pastoral. Wheat and barley are cultivated over large areas, as are pulses, sugarcane, and oilseeds. Cotton and tobacco are cash crops. Rajasthan is among the largest producers of edible oils in India and the second largest producer of oilseeds. Rajasthan is also the biggest wool-producing state in



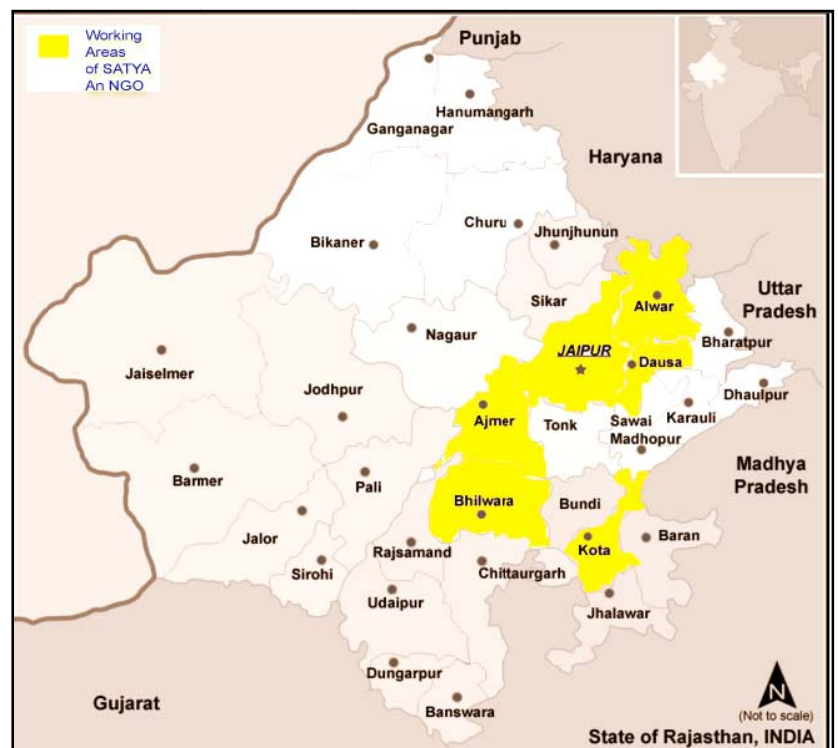
India and the main opium producer and consumer. There are mainly two crop seasons. The water for irrigation comes from wells and tanks. The Indira Gandhi Canal irrigates northwestern Rajasthan. The main industries are mineral based, agriculture based, and textiles. Rajasthan is the second largest producer of polyester fiber in India. The Bhilwara District produces more cloth than Bhiwandi, Maharashtra. Several prominent chemical and engineering companies are located in the town of Kota, in western Rajasthan. Rajasthan is pre-eminent in quarrying and mining in India. The state is the second largest source of cement in India. It has rich salt deposits at Sambhar, copper mines at Khetri and zinc mines at Dariba, Zawar mines at Zawarmala for zinc, rampura aghucha (opencast) near Bhilwara. Dimensional stone mining is also undertaken in Rajasthan: Jodhpur sandstone is mostly used in monuments, important buildings, residential buildings, etc. This stone is termed "chittar patthar".

Rajasthan is now the preferred destination for IT companies and North India's largest integrated IT park is located in Jaipur and is named as Mahindra World City Jaipur covering nearly 3,000 acres (12 km²) of land. Some of the companies operating in Rajasthan include Infosys, Genpact, Wipro, Truworth, Deutsche Bank, NEI, MICO, Honda Siel Cars, Coca Cola, and Gillette.

Rajasthan has a mainly Rajasthani population. Hindus account for 88.8% of the population. Muslims make up 8.5%, Sikhs 1.4% and Jains 1.2% of the population. The state of Rajasthan is also populated by Sindhis, who came to Rajasthan from Sindh province (now in Pakistan) during the India-Pakistan separation in 1947. The mother tongue of the majority of people in Rajasthan is Rajasthani. Rajasthani and Hindi are the most widely used languages in Rajasthan. After independence, Rajasthani was used as a medium of instruction, along with Hindi and English, in some schools. Some other languages used in Rajasthan are Gujarati, Sindhi and Punjabi.

About SATYA

SATYA An NGO is a non-profit voluntary organization. SATYA been active since 2001 and formally registered in 2004, under the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958. SATYA's new leadership has gradually moved away from the "money-making growth at any price" strategy of the past and toward new-fangled "democratic system". This shift has been accompanied by substantial efforts to grapple with Poverty, MMR, IMR, Dignity of the Girl Child, Primary Education, Women Empowerment, Urbanization, Rural Migration, HIV/AIDS, Surrogacy, Human Rights etc. and address serious economic and governance issues like capacity building of PRIs. At SATYA, women are benefiting from new economic opportunities, but poverty in rural areas disproportionately harms women.



SATYA has paid attention to make policies work for people, especially for the poor, and for policy processes to be opened up and be made more transparent, democratic, participatory and accountable, which is required to bridge the persistent gaps between policy and practice, and between national level policy making and the experience of quality

of life at the community level. SATYA is dynamically effective in the field of enhancing Justice for the marginalized by offering its advocacy services. The NGO is committed to equalize the community for problems like juvenile in conflict with law child labor, Surrogacy, Sex determination test, domestic violence, rape, and sexual harassment etc. SATYA is focused to enhance access to Justice through legal empowerment for the marginalized in India.

SATYA is functioning as a Resource agency, for providing technical & legal services to help Non Government Organizations (NGOs). SATYA provides consultancy in different places and cities in Rajasthan & Gujarat states of India in the shades of Documentation, IECs, and Project Proposals/Reports etc. It has catered its professional services to Government, Non Government & Private sector agencies by shooting legal, technical and fund raising problems.

SATYA is presently working in six districts of Rajasthan viz. Alwar, Kota, Udaipur, Dausa, Bhilwara, Bharatpur and Jaipur including the rural belts of Chomu (Mainly TITERIA Panchayat), Chaksu and Jobner (Bhagawas Panchayat) in Rajasthan. SATYA has stretched out its programmes to SOME OTHER DISTRICTS OF Rajasthan SIROHI, Banswara and jodhpur apart from inter-state expansion with Uttar Pradesh.

The challenge now remains to learn the lessons that this year's experience has taught and to apply these to future planning and implementation of SATYA's plans & activities.

- ❖ Integrated development of any field relevant to society through human development by creating desired resources, utilizing available resources and performing combined efforts into action.

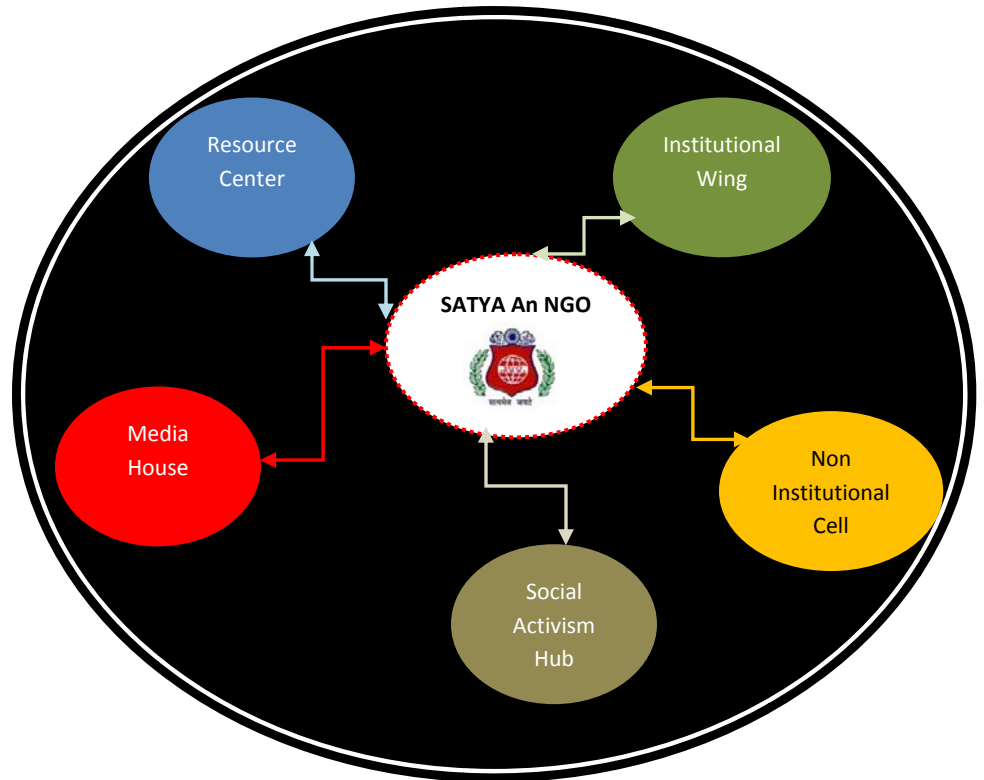
Concept of Family Institutions:

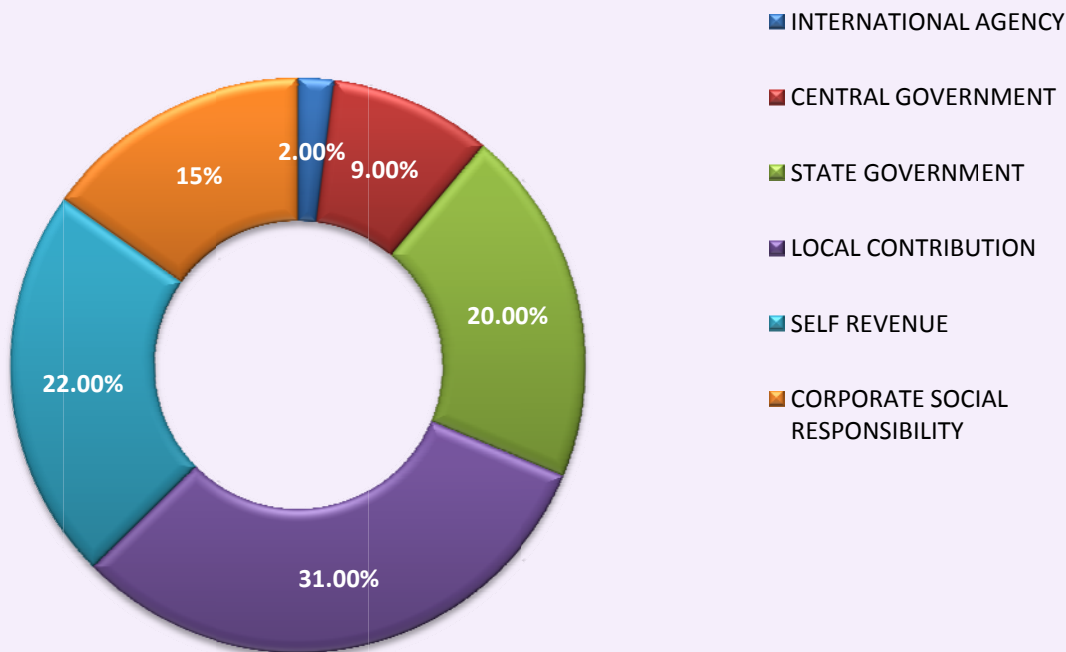
Composition of SATYA's Family Institutions :-

- A. Resource Center***
- B. Institutional Wing***
- C. Non-Institutional Cell***
- D. Social Activism Hub***
- E. Media House***

The above mentioned divisions are the core establishments of the NGO-SATYA, which are also known as 'Family Institutions'. Fundamentally, the key function of these institutions is to promote the SATYA in the area of Development by showcasing its efforts globally. The Family Institutions of SATYA are framed up-to-date for helping the marginalized and the underserved populace of the India. This NGO has been working effectively and efficiently since **5 years** in the state of Rajasthan covering all divisions. The mission of these institutions together is to work and help the Government and Non-government agencies; NGO Partners and Community in achieving MDGs. The key objective of the Satya's sunshade (Family Institutions) is to help the Planning Commission in undertaking the Evaluations of the Five Year Plans through supporting and strengthening of the 3 tier apparatus of Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs).

A. Resource Center: (research & training and consultancy)

Resource center is the first segment of Satya's family institutions. The Resource Center is functioning as a technical backstopping unit. Presently it is performing as a **'Think Tank'** for its NGO partners; Govt. and Non Govt. agencies & Corporate sector, by generating all potential solutions for their expansion and establishment. Apart from supporting these agencies, it has always been concerned for the community by acting as **'Knowledge Repository'** for their Upliftment, Youth Mobilization, Urbanization, Gender Mainstreaming, Reducing Rural Migration, Women Empowerment, Saving Dignity of the Girl Child, Population Stabilization, Promoting child education, Strengthening PRIs/VHCs, Bringing down the MMR, IMR and Malnutrition Rate, Climate Change, Improving Water Structures, Solid Waste Management, Poverty Alleviation through IT Intervention, Livelihood Promotion and Mobilization of Farmers.

The **key objective** of Resource Center is to Support establishment of social partnership between Govt., non govt. and commercial organizations by providing technical assistance through consultancy, Research studies and training in Public policy advocacy, Capacity building, Meeting grant problems, Increasing role of civil society structures in decision making processes, Enhancing organizational effectiveness, and Improving Socio-cultural systems for the promotion of Gender sensitive participatory approach to sustainable social and economic development.

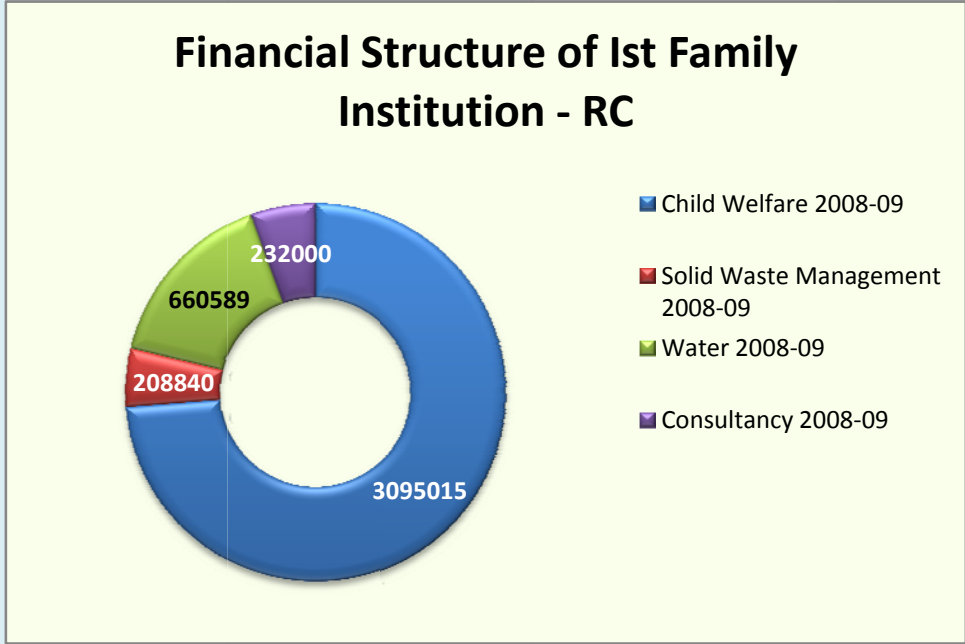


Figure 1 depicting financial-flow structure of RC

Figure 1 depicts the financial-flow structure of the 1st Family Institution – Resource Center (RC). The thrust programs (in the increasing order of financial-flow) covered under RC are: 1. Child-Line (8,93,643/-) 2. RIFMP (6,60,589/-) 3. Adoption Research (3,289,75/-), 4. Child Labor (2,76,895/-), 5. NIPCCD (2,36,750/-), 6. Project Management (2,32,000/-), 7. Solid Waste Management (2,08,840/-), 8. JJ Act and Teen Book (59,956). There was a total of 28,97,648(INR) fund available for the implementation of above sited 8 projects under the Family Institution – RC.

Details of the activities carried out under 1st Family Institution RC are as below:

Satya makes the most of this fund and fully utilized this amount by meeting the timelines and producing the desired outputs in terms of conducting base-line surveys, hiring of personnel & project accessories, formation and revival of SHGs, developing technical manuals (IECs), organizing trainings/seminars/workshops, conducting village/block/district/state/national/international level consultations, exposure visits, mid-term assessment, Follow-up programs and activities, M&E, developing S/W & website, distributing IECs, Media Campaigning, end-line assessment, Final report preparation, printing & presentation etc.

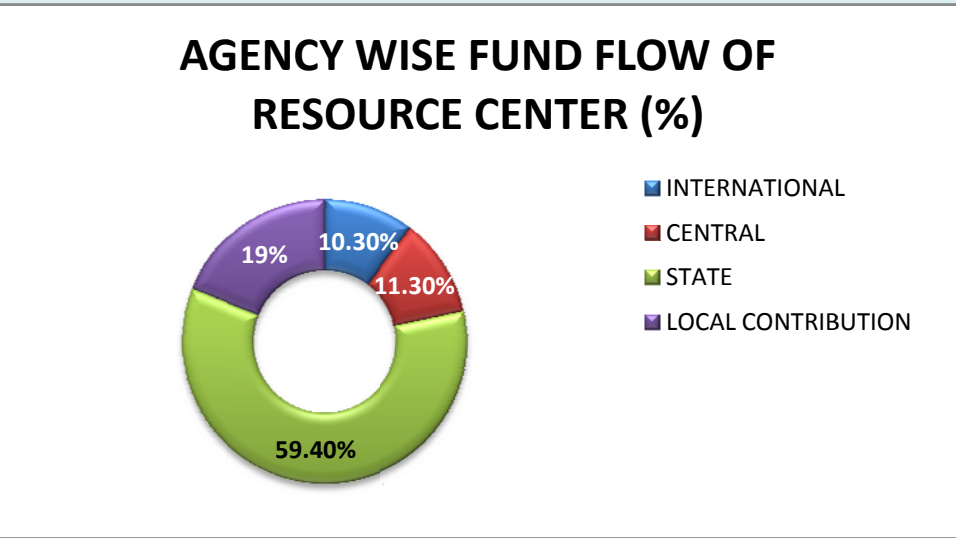


Figure 2 depicting AGENCY WISE financial-flow structure of RC

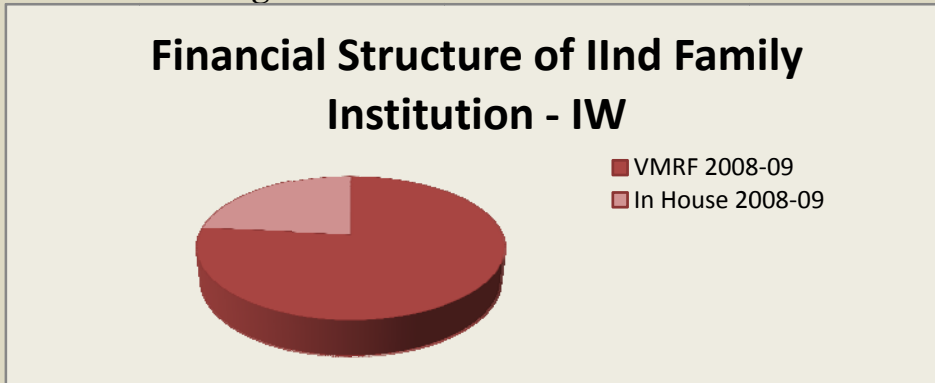


Figure 3 depicting financial-flow structure of IW

Details of the activities carried out under 2nd Family Institution are:

In house programmes comprise of E-learning, Computer Training, Ek Gram Ek Sanstha and VMRF consists of Educational Counseling at Fair's and Renowned Educational Institutions viz. University of Rajasthan, Kanodia College, Bapu Nagar etc. This fund was fully utilized in terms of advertising in newspapers, participating in education fair, canopies, hiring of faculties & purchasing of course accessories, adaptation of learning materials, developing handouts, organizing seminars, counseling, promotional activities, reporting - preparation, printing & presentation etc. The two main programmes under IW are mentioned below:

Financial Structure of IIIrd Family Institution - NIC

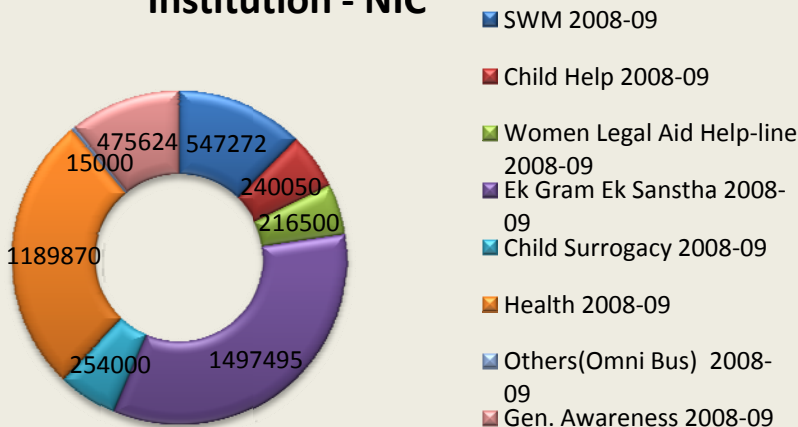


Figure 4 depicting financial-flow structure of NIC

SWM (5,47,272/-) 2. Child Help (2,40,050/-) 3. Women Legal-aid Help-line (2,16,500/-), 4. Ek Gram Ek Sanstha (14,97,495/-), 5. Child Surrogacy (2,54,000/-), 6. Health (11,89,870/-), 7. Others (Omni Bus 15,000/-), 8. Gen. Awareness (4,75,624).

There was a total of 44,35,811 (INR) fund available for the implementation of above sited 8 projects under the Family Institution – NIC.

Details of the activities carried out under 3rd Family Institution NIC are:

Financial Structure of IVth Family Institution - SAH

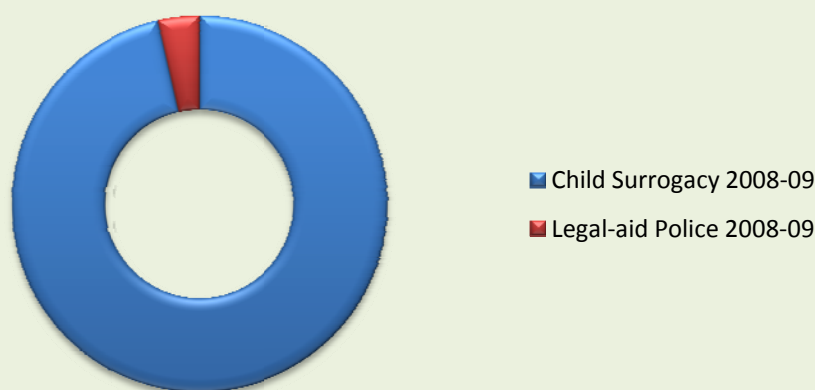


Figure 4 depicts the financial-flow structure of the 4th Family Institution – Social Activism Hub (SAH).

Details of the activities carried out under 4th Family Institution SAH are:

There was a total of 15,54,188 (INR) fund available for the implementation of above sited 2 projects under the Family Institution – SAH. This fund was fully utilized in terms of advertising in newspapers, participating in community driven activities for help Rajasthan Police, canopies, hiring of & purchasing of programme accessories, development of IECs, organizing seminars/workshops, counseling, promotional activities, reporting - preparation, printing & presentation etc.

E. Media House

Media House is the fifth Family institution of SATYA An NGO. In the first phase of this programme, SATYA is going to start its own dream newsletter named as “SATYA Discovery”, which will broach upon the social issues like Child Surrogacy, Child Rights, Women Empowerment (Saving dignity of the girl child as PC-PNDT, MTP, Domestic Violence, Property Rights of Women and livelihood promotion), IMR, MMR, Malnutrition, Poverty alleviation, Migration problems, uplifting farmers and the underprivileged, Equal educational opportunities etc. Thus SATYA had incorporated this segment into the Family tree.

Objective:

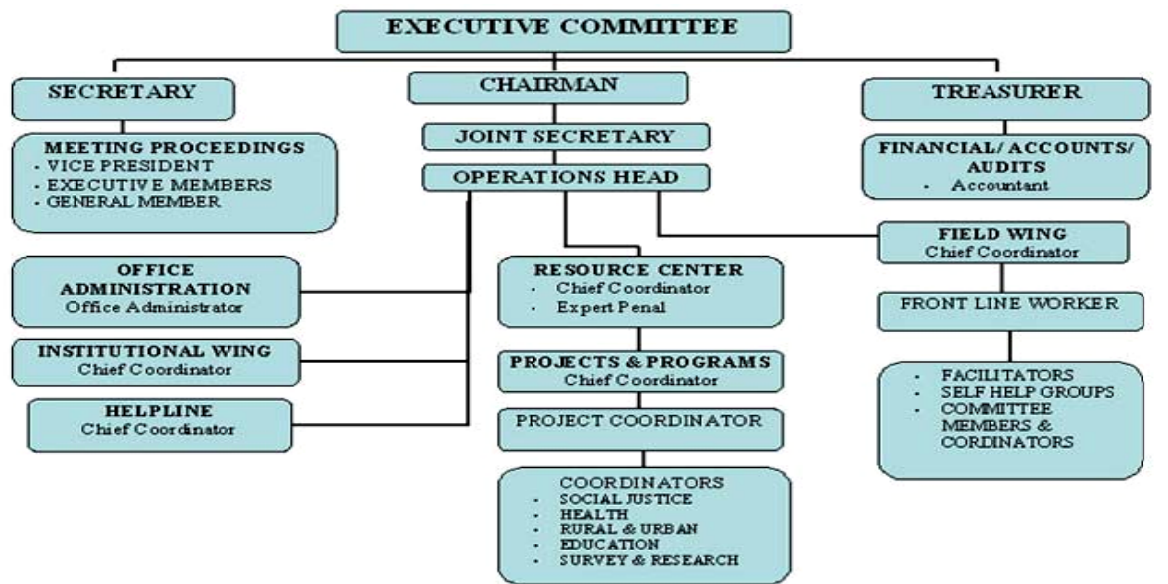
- To make Documentaries on the above cited issues in order to help the marginalized by enhancing their accesses to Justice.
